3 Rushden to Thrapston

## Rushden to Thrapston

Explore miles of footpaths, cycle routes and bridleway along this part of the Nene Valley and discover hidden hamlets, a haven for wildlife and ancient churches. Visitors can follow the Nene Way along the banks of the river for part or all of its 70 miles as it goes up hill and down dale.

A network of footpaths and bridleways allow you to plan anything from a short walk to a full days hike. The naturally serene landscape offers the perfect backdrop to any one of the adventurous activities on offer in the valley such as canoeing, kayaking, boating, cycling and fishing.

Explore key sites and attractions along the way including nature reserves, retail destinations and some of the most stunning scenery in the county!



## The Nepe Wettands Nature Reserve .....

Discover a wonderful stretch of rare wildflower meadows and flooded gravel pits, now a hugely valuable wetland for birds and other wildlife. **The Nene Wetlands** lies at the heart of the Nene Valley, one of the most important wetlands in England and an internationally important stop-over for thousands of wildfowl and waders.

Bordering the **River Nene**, the site is home to wintering golden plover, wigeon and gadwall, while in spring it resounds with the songs of warblers and the call of the cuckoo. In summer, the nature reserve comes alive with thousands of dragonflies, damselflies and other insects that provide an excellent source of food for bats.

Around the river and lakes, fragments of precious meadows survive, awash with fragrant meadowsweet, cuckoo flower, buttercup and great burnet.

The Nene Wetlands is managed by the Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants and is their largest nature reserve in the county. Livestock, including highland cattle, are used to maintain the wildflower meadows and beavers have been re-introduced to help manage the wet woodland at **Rushden Lakes.** The Wildlife Trust BCN is a charity and relies on the support of its members to fund its vital conservation work in the Nene Valley, and across the three counties.

### Wildlife

Many of the lakes within the Nene Valley form part of the **Upper Nene Valley Gravel Pits Special Protection Area**; a protected wildlife site of European importance for its over - wintering birds. The wildlife in the valley can be susceptible to disturbance; please ensure that you help safeguard the unique value of the wildlife in the valley by keeping dogs on a lead and keeping to official and permissive paths.

The Nene Way footpath is a good place to see butterflies. The nettle beds along the rivers are used as perches for huge numbers of Banded Demoiselle damselflies, while the floating vegetation in the river provides resting sites for the red-eyed damselfly.

### Stanwick lakes ...

Stanwick Lakes is a unique 750 acre countryside attraction and nature reserve, and is widely considered to be one of the region's most imaginative outdoor activity destinations, which also has plenty to see and do indoors. It offers extensive play areas to keep adventurous families entertained for hours, and for nature lovers, walkers and cyclists, acres of wide open spaces and paths, where blue skies are reflected in tranquil waters.

Greenway Cycle Route:
 Smooth surface suitable for all cyclists on any type of bike, pedestrians, pushchairs, wheelchairs and mobility scooters.

#### Stanwick Lakes:

Good surfaces, suitable for most users (cyclists on most types of bikes, walkers, pushchairs, wheelchairs and mobility scooters).

#### Islip-Stanwick Lakes:

National Cycle Route suitable for cyclists, on hybrid or mountain bikes and walkers. Very rough and muddy in places.


