




Walking Map

Aldwincle, Wadenhoe & Lyveden



Route Info:

Duration: 2.5 - 3 Hours

Difficulty: ★★★☆☆

(Some steep inclines)



Aldwincle, Wadenho E lyveden

These circular walks give you the opportunity to start at any of these villages:

- Aldwincle: Start at the Nene Way opposite Lowick Road junction or on the Main Street near to the Pocket Park.
- Thorpe Waterville: Start near the village sign on the road towards Aldwincle.
- Achurch: Start on the road to Thorpe at the last house on the right heading towards Thorpe Waterville.
- Wadenhoe: Start near the Village Hall or near to the Dovecote.

This map features two routes - both of which can be accessed and embarked upon from **Wadenhoe**.



The loop of the **River Nene** probably gave Alwincle its name and it was recorded in the Domesday Book as Eldwincle - a Saxon name "Ealda" and the Old English "Wincle" meaning old nook or corner. Settlement here dates back even further, with a **Roman settlement** discovered south of the village. Until 1879 the village had two parishes, each with a church, rectory and manor.

The beautiful broach spire, tower and chancel of **St. Peter's Church** date to the late 14th century, but there is evidence of earlier Norman origins. The church has wonderful stained glass - look out for the figures of St. George and St. Christopher. Outside a carved frieze of animals and birds encircles the entrance.

Dating back to the 13th century with a pinnacled and carved 15th century tower, **All Saints' Church** has been

disused for over a hundred years.
The church is now in the care of the
Churches Conservation Trust and
visitors can now camp overnight at

Opposite **All Saints' Church** stands the stone, plaster and thatch birthplace of John Dryden, 17th century Poet Laureate to King Charles II. Born in 1631, Dryden gained renown as a playwright and poet, being buried in Westminster Abbey.

Achurch

Achurch was once part of the **Lilford Park Estate**. A famous descendant of the village was John Quincy Adams, sixth President of the USA, related to Achurch residents Edmund and Judith Quincy who travelled to America in the 1630s.



The village is also home to the Grade II listed Church of St John the Baptist - a beautiful early and late 13th century Anglican church which was restored and enlarged in 1862 by architect William Slater.

Wildlife

The traditionally managed farmland on the **River Nene** floodplain between Aldwincle and Wadenhoe is a haven for many kinds of wildlife. Look out for snipe and heron, magnificent pollarded willows or even otters.

Titchmarsh Nature Reserve

Titchmarsh is part of the **Thrapston Gravel Pits complex**, which lies within the Upper Nene Valley gravel pits Site of Special Scientific Interest. The biggest lake is Aldwincle Lake, which provides a large area for overwintering birds. The walking trail around the reserve is on a hard surfaced track with kissing gates to one bird hide, otherwise grass paths. Wadephoe ·····

The village was built in what was once a deer park and dates back to 1657. The current village is made up of 17th, 18th and 19th century limestone buildings with thatched roofs or Collyweston slate tiles and pan tiles. The marshy area along the banks of the river forms part of a designated Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI).

ST, Michael & All Angels Church

The parish church has Anglo-Saxon parts and a 12th century saddleback tower. Treasures to discover include its six bells, the Green Man carving inside, the scratch dials outside and the stained glass windows.

lyveden

Dominating the local landscape, **Lyveden** was designed by Sir Thomas Tresham, to express his devout Catholic faith during the reign of the Protestant Queen Elizabeth I. It was his son, Frances Tresham, who later became embroiled in the Gunpowder Plot.

Lyveden was incomplete when Sir Thomas died in 1605 and remains a haunting survival of the Elizabethan age. the building has a religious design full of symbolism - with a layout based on the design of a Greek Cross.

Key Sites along the Way!



All Saints Church

Offering evidence of Norman origins, the church spire and tower date back to the 14th century and feature wonderful stained glass - look out for the figures of St. George and St. Christopher. Outside, a carved frieze of animals and birds encircles the entrance.



Titchmarsh Local, Nature Reserve

Part of the Thrapston Gravel Pits complex, which lies within a Site of Special Scientific Interest. The reserve features a range of beautiful walking trails offering opportunities to take in the stunning wildlife, including a large area for overwintering birds.



The Old Rectory

Opposite All Saints' Church stands the stone, plaster and thatch birthplace of John Dryden, 17th century Poet Laureate to King Charles II. Born in 1631, Dryden gained renown as a playwright and poet, being buried in Westminster Abbey.

Now owned by the National Trust, Lyveden is a stunning, unfinished Elizabethan summer house in the parish of Aldwincle. Commissioned by Sir Thomas Tresham, the property features a number of unique religious inspired designs and architectural features.
